More on Lignum Vitae

In response to the article last month about rebushing a clapper, the following was received:

It was interesting to read of Chris Greef's experience with Lignum Vitae in a clapper at Winterbourne. Lignum Vitae is a very hard and dense wood. These properties mean that, among other uses, it was employed for bearings. The USS Nautilus, the world's first nuclear powered submarine had one of its main shaft bearings made out of the stuff. The wood contains natural oils that make bearings self-lubricating. I suspect that the Lignum Vitae at Winterbourne was the original bearing and has simply been retained as a backing to a later repair. I doubt that a wood as hard as this would prevent vibrations being transmitted.

The new Central Council booklet "Manual of Belfry Maintenance"* mentions Lignum Vitae bushes and says that, in spite of the self-lubricating properties, these bushes need additional lubrication. However, it also says that the material is no longer used because the timber has been exploited to the point of extinction - trade in Lignum Vitae is controlled under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora" (CITES). Because of these restrictions, a worn Lignum Vitae bush should be replaced with a modern alternative. Of course, this doesn't prevent Winterbourne from retaining a worn one as a backing piece!

CCTV Cameras at Corston

Affiliation to the G&B Association

Most of you will not be aware that your tower in 2017 was affiliated to the Association and has been for many years! You can find out if you are affiliated by looking in the G & B annual report, under your tower, in branch details, you will see an 'A'. All Rural branch towers in 2017 were affiliated, even Doynton!

Yearly the Association treasurer writes to your PCC asking if they wish to affiliate for the coming year, that will currently be 2018. However, there is a change this year, agreed at the

Association AGM in April, in that the affiliation fee will rise from £10.00 to £20.00.

What does your PCC and church get from affiliating to the G & B? Briefly, if your tower has any major work carried out to the bells or the fittings or any repairs to the same, your tower can apply for a grant to the G & B bellfund to cover some of the cost, up to about 10% of the cost. (Almost all your annual subscription goes into the bellfund).

Abson's recent headstock repairs received a £40.00 grant (see picture).

When affiliated the tower receives a certificate which you should see if you look in your church porch or on the church notice board. This contains information about your practice night, when you ring for services, who is the Tower Captain or contact for the ringers and a means of contacting them. It is important that this certificate is kept up to date by your Tower Captain so visiting ringers know when you ring. It can also lead to an enquiry from potential new ringers as happened recently at Dyrham.

The format of the affiliation certificate had been very dull, but several years ago the format was changed to a coloured A4 document which is much more visible, a change prompted by myself at an Association Branch Officers' meeting..

Your tower's affiliation certificate can be found on the branch website under <Branch Affairs> and it can be downloaded and amended as required. So do make sure it is up to date and on display.
