## Tower tours

(Advice from Ecclesiastical Insurance)
Tours present a good way to engage with non-ringers and are part of some churches' everyday activities. Visitors on tower tours are often unfamiliar with church buildings and especially with towers, so extra precautions should be taken to manage the risks of people getting hurt.
Tower tours should always be arranged in liaison with the PCC, and it is their responsibility to ensure precautions are adequate. However, ringers may know the tower better than the PCC and so should be in a good position to help identify risks and suggest reasonable precautions. Things to think about include:

Are there any particularly difficult to access areas - is there an alternative route the tour could take to avoid this problem area altogether? If not, what do you need to do to ensure visitors are safe traversing this area?

Do you need to set a limit to the number of people per tour to ensure safe escape is possible the event of an emergency?

Is there a maximum number of people you can safely have in the ringing room whilst you're demonstrating ringing, to ensure they are all out of the way of the rope?

Consider how many stewards you will need to ensure people don't have to pass on the stairs, for example. You should try to have stewards at each level if possible (roof, bells, clock room, ringing room, bottom of the stairs ...)

Is the tower properly lit? Remember visitors may not be used to climbing steep spiral staircases so may need more lighting than you or I in order to feel safe.
